Musician Martie Maguire gives us a tour of her adopted hometown

off the beaten path

or Grammy-winning musician Martie Maguire, it was Austin's eclectic lifestyle that attracted her to the city 13 years ago and ultimately persuaded her to stay. And though she is a member of both the Dixie Chicks and the Court Yard Hounds-her band with sister and fellow Dixie Chick Emily Robison-Martie still finds time to keep tabs on the everchanging Austin scene. We asked the talented musician to take us on a tour of her favorite spots around Austin that are off the beaten path, yet easy to duck into on a whim.

Jo's Coffee

Although the original South Congress outpost is known for the sentimental scrawl on its outside wall-it reads, "I love you so much"-and its prime people-watching scene, Martie prefers the newer Second Street location for a cup of hot tea and a Texas-sized omelet. (242 W. Second St., joscoffee.com)

Luke's Inside Out

Nearly every Austinite has a favorite food trailer, and this South Lamar stop is it for Martie. With chef Luke Bibby's rotating menu ranging from over-the-top to healthy, there's something for everyone. "His salads are like works of art, and the burger is just decadent," Martie says. Henri's

Another small gem on the bustling South Lamar corridor is Henri's, the perfect place to sip a glass of Cava on a late afternoon while sampling a selection of delicious cheeses, salamis, and smoked meats. (2026 S. Lamar Blvd., henrischeese.com)

Lick

For dessert, step next door to Henri's and grab an ice cream cone at Lick. The surprising concoctions—flavors include Texas Sheet Cake; Grapefruit with Champagne Marshmallows; and Goat Cheese, Thyme & Honey—are made with pure, whole ingredients sourced from local farmers and dairies whenever possible. Moss

Drive a little farther down the road approaching downtown, and you'll discover Moss. It's the type of store you walk into ready to be delighted by the thrill of the find-an upscale resale boutique whose buyers have an eye for both timeless and funky designer pieces. Case in point: the inside-out rabbit fur coat that Martie scored for less than \$100. (705B S. Lamar Blvd., mossaustin.com)

Blackmail

South Congress can be an overwhelming avenue for some, but take a tip from Martie and seek shelter from the crowds in Gail Chovan's Blackmail boutique-worth visiting for both the fashion and the fixtures. On more than one occasion,

Stag

For a more masculine turn, don't miss Stag-a menswear shop that embraces the unexpected. Offering new and vintage clothing, accessories, artwork, and even taxidermy, Stag isn't your run-of-the-mill men's shop. (1423 S. Congress Ave., stagaustin.com)







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Mercury Design Studio

Because you won't want to stop when you're on a roll, Mercury is next on the list of must-see shops. Like a few of Martie's favorites, Mercury sits in the middle of the Second Street District, beckoning passersby to explore the store's artistic vignettes. Of particular interest? The art on the walls. "I found a print of some lips that I just love, and now it hangs in my twin daughters' room," says Martie. (225 W. Second St., mercurydesignstudio.com)

Uptown Modern

Situated on a stretch of Burnet Road that's dotted with stores selling vintage items, Uptown Modern is where Martie goes when in search of a true statement piece—like the Lucite table and matching chairs she currently loves. East Side King

Austin wholeheartedly embraces its food trucks. In return, the mobile grub hubs promise to keep things interesting. Like the colorful designs by artist







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Peelander-Yellow that adorn its trucks. East Side King's Asian-inspired fare is anything but boring. East Side King also now has two brick-and-mortar locations. (eskaustin.com)

The Continental Club

Having been in bands that zigzagged all across Texas, Martie appreciates an authentic atmosphere that stays true to its roots. The fact that this oasis of lowkey live music has looked and felt the same since her college days no doubt adds to its comfortable vibe and sentimental value. Hotel Saint Cecilia

Hotel Saint Cecilia is the ultimate spot to kick back with friends and bask in the glow of Austin's charm. Beautiful in design and natural environment, the Saint Cecilia sits just off

bustling South Congress Avenue and plays host to a number of local artists on any given evening. "The owner, Liz Lambert, is so essential to Austin's look and coolness," Martie says. "She's one of the biggest entrepreneurs in town, always contributing something exciting."
